HISTORY
OF
CLALLAM COUNTY AMATEUR RADIO CLUB

In the beginning, the club meetings were very informal. In fact, it could hardly be called a club. Some of the men interested in getting together to have a rag chew were:

There may have been others who participated.

In 1954, Jerry Vergeer, the City Manager for Port Angeles, became the president of the group. Through his efforts, a section of the Salmon Club Restaurant was given to the club. The Salmon Club Building had to be moved west on the Spit because the Coast Guard needed the area for a runway for airplanes.

The Ham Club members had to move their section of the building.

In 1955, Norm Keller became president. He had charge of moving the building. A Korean War Veteran helped him.

When it came time to move the building, the men couldn't get it up on the trucks to move it because the concrete cement block that was the base for the fireplace projected down too far, so Norm Keller placed a shot of dynamite into the cement block and it blew into four pieces and they were able to get the building up on the trucks to move it west. It was farther west than where the Salmon Club Building stands today. The members looked the building over and found too much had to be done to the building to get it in shape for club use.

In 1957, Roy Moyer became president and Jim Cornell was secretary. Now, there is a written record for the club.

The club house on the Spit was discussed. It was decided that they did not want the club house for there were too many problems in maintaining it. As far as we know, it was returned to the City.

The club decided to try getting a room for meetings at the YMCA.

During this year, the members decided to become incorporated and applied to the state. The Article of Incorporation for Clallam County Amateur Radio Club of Port Angeles, Washington is dated the 8th day of January, A.D. 1957, at 10:40 o'clock A.M.. It is signed by Earl Coe, Secretary of State. This is microfilmed on Roll 120 at page 1139-1142.

In 1958, Robert (Bob Burke) became president. The club decided to have two meetings a month. Bob Schoettler suggested that the first meeting be a business meeting and the second be a general program meeting.

Vic Glidden announced the starting up of the Clallam County Amateur Radio Club Emergency Corp. Members to check in the 2nd and 4th Thursday at 8:00 P.M. on 3940 KC, starting September 11th. Gil Morrish moved the club have a dinner at Roy Moyer's on Sunday, August 24th. The motion passed.

The park personnel were interested in portable units packing into the park, when hiking groups are interested in ground to air relay point.

A motion passed that the Radio Club consider itself as a contributing member to the "Y" and cards not be issued to Radio Club members as rent for a room.

November 9, 1958 the club had a spaghetti dinner at Moyer's with the spaghetti left over from the Victoria Short Wave Club picnic that CCARC hosted at Lincoln Park in August. To quote from a letter received from the Victoria Short Wave Club Secretary, David Schales, dated October 15, 1958.

"The success of this picnic suggested that perhaps it ought to be perpetuated, though on a reciprocal basis.....
In the meantime you may rest assured that all here anticipate meeting you all next year and renewing the friendship which amateur radio has made possible."

To which Secretary Bern Crowel responded that CCARC members would be happy to attend a picnic hosted by the Victoria Club.

There was so much spaghetti left over, the minutes read:"Spaghetti left over (gobs) given to the Salvation Army."

In the December 4, 1958 minutes Tom Hutchings made a motion that each member put in the kitty one dime. A name drawn wins half of kitty at each meeting. The motion was seconded and passed. The kitty is still drawn at each meeting of CCARC.

The officers nominated for the next year were:

In 1959, Bob Burke was president.

At the board meeting of January 6 it was brought up about having a larger room for club meetings so in February, the club met in Gil Morrish's Radio Shop.

The By-Laws had been written by 1956 and Article III was revised by a motion by Hap Helgeson, which passed. The article now reads: "The principal plan of business shall be as perscribed by the Board with approval of majority of members."

The Board feels the club should have a club owned transmitter. President Bob Burke suggested the Radio Club should build their own transmitter.

The Vern Roberts Memorial Library is to be located at Gil Morrish's Radio-TV Shop. Gil to handle the library and Terry Burke to construct the shelves. Bob Burke would contact Bern Crowell for a plaque.

The last Board meeting was October 22, 1959. There are no minutes recorded from this time until 1964.

In 1964, Joe Coburn was president. Fritz Conrad was appointed to select a suitable club ham shack. Gil Morrish's TV Repair Shop on Lincoln was selected as a meeting place.

A letter was sent to Amateur Radio Relay League (ARRL) concerning affiliation October 1, 1964.

At the Board of Directors meeting, held every quarter, it was decided the Trustee is the legal representative of the club.

There were 33 members by this time.

In 1965, Gil Welcher was president. The club met at Port Angeles Police Department Pistol Range. Frank Ferrich moved to open a checking account at Olympic State Bank to pay club expenses like heat, light, rent, etc. Then the club met at Gales Addition Fire Department.

The CCARC hosted Victoria Club to a picnic on August 1st and they accepted.

Bob Burke conducted a class in radio theory at the LDS Church; a Boy Scout function, but High School boys were welcome.

The International picnic was at the Fairview Grange picnic grounds. There were 75 present with 32 from Victoria attending.

Three sites were inspected for a meeting place and the Dawson place was selected.

Bill and Doris Dawson were invited to the club banquet at Haguwoods on December 16.

Bruce Thompson reported the club scored 3906 for Field Day results.

Norm Keller taught an Electronic Night class on a basic college level.

In 1966, Gil Welcher was president. The County set up a van for Civil Defense and volunteer members from the club furnished operators. Two meters were used for the County Net.

The Field Day site was on the County Game Preserve on February 17th.

The club call received from the Federal Communication Commission (F.C.C.) was WA7FHV. Later, after Bob Burke passed away, the club applied for his call "W7FEL" as a memorial to him.

The club house was put up for sale but the new landlord, Willie Gormely, gave permission to the club to use the present quarters for the foreseeable future, if it is kept clean and the club takes care of the room.

The "Boondocker" award was displayed by Scotty and he read the rules.

In September, Secretary C. R. Aimes (W7IBR) resigned due to leaving town going to Centralia.

Fritz Conrad was elected to complete the year. Aimes received a "Distinguished Service" award and Fritz read a poem of farewell dedicated to Carrol, which he had written.

Joe Coburn was appointed Emergency Coordinator for this area.

The Victoria Short Wave Club accepted the invitation to CCARC's picnic for August 21st.

October 8-9 were listed as set for the 1966 Simulated Emergency Test, which is becoming an annual event.

The Club's QSL cards were handsomely done by Henry Franzen, KJRJU.

The president read a rough draft of proposed City Ordinance relating to antenna structures.

In 1967, Fritz Conrad resigned in April as president then Scotty Haller was president. A letter was sent to Mr. Harold Fish thanking him for speaking at the Annual Dinner at Haguwoods on January 4th.

The mattresses not needed upstairs in the Bayview Apartments were encroaching on club space.

The picnic date for International picnic was set for August 6 at Fairview Grange - Victoria club accepted.

Hap reported on papers dealing with affiliation with ARRL and read "Resolution of Affiliation". A vote to accept the resolution was passed unanimously. The application was signed and sent to ARRL for review of application. Hap said that processing through channels takes about two months.

The club had a booth at the Clallam County Fair.

The Horse club wanted members to handle communication of their competition at Telegraphic Horse Race. The Horse Show went off perfectly using 75m. Sandy and Gil put up antenna and Spence and Gil operated the equipment.

Field Day was at Voice of America this year.

In 1968, Sandy Richardson was president. The Victoria picnic will be June 7 at Shawnigon Lake and CCARC accepted the invitation.

The Department of Natural Resources wants a letter about the first of June about Field Day as the Voice of America Site is on the State Park Land and requires a fire permit.

Les gave a report on the progress in the College Class members are teaching.

The International Ski Race had Ham coverage and Gil Welcher presented a tape on the race to the club.

Amendment was made to club By-Laws in regard to family membership.

Milt was instructor for code at Port Townsend school, 17 students took the course.

Phill Simmons was moving to Seattle so George Leslie took the secretary office for the rest of the year.

Instead of an annual dinner at a restaurant the XYL's requested a pot-luck dinner. Leo supplied the linen. Club furnished the meat.

Two classes at the College were given in Advanced and Beginners courses.

Gilman Welcher was elected Trustee.

Governor Daniel Evans stated September 1 through 8, 1968 as Washington State Amateur Radio Week. He called upon all citizens to "Salute the Amateur Operators in expressing grateful appreciation for unselfish service rendered by these private individuals."

There were several press articles on Ham news in this year.

In 1969, Vern St. Louis was president. It was moved, seconded and passed to have meetings on first and third Wednesday nights at Leo's Laundry.

Vern St. Louis gave a good report on his activities on phone patch.

The By-Laws were changed to have the Trustee serve for a term of 5 years.

The Ham License plates were ready and will be available in a week or two.

Jim Perozzo will look into another meeting place as club might have to move from the laundry.

The Voice of Democracy will be the site for Field Day.

August 21st was the final day set for the Victoria Club to join CCARC picnic.

There are 54 members on the club Roster.

In 1970, Jim Cloud was president. It was announced that Australia would launch the Oscar Satellite on January 26.

Membership is up to 69 members.

Jake Leons took the duty of Emergency Control net.

The appointment of a representative of the club in state matters was very necessary before March 1st, suffering the penalty of losing the incorporation of the club. Hap Helgeson responded.

Australian "Oscar" is dead.

Fairview Grange Hall Grounds were reserved for Field Day. Dell Downing chaired F.D.

The Victoria Short Wave Club picnic was set for June 14th at Shawnigon Lake.

The Internal Revenue Service suggested re-applying for a non-profit status as a Hobby Club.

The film "Hams Wide World" will be here May 26th. Kiwanis, Rotary, and Lions clubs were to be contacted to see if they would like to show the film at their meetings.

In June meeting, Hap reported IRS gave club non-profit status and would be exempt from paying taxes, but it is required that form 990 is filled out and sent in every year.

Washington State Ham Fest was in Tacoma July 11th & 12th.

Gil Reported Bul. #278 on Oscar 6 being put up by Radio American Satellite Corp. It will last one year and can be used by unsophisticated gear. The club agreed to become a member and take an active part in the program.

Leo read Bul. #279 stating 40 countries have reciprocal operating agreements with United States.

The club agreed to hold only one meeting on the third Thursday, next year.

Hap Helgeson presided over June 18th and July 2nd meetings.

Jim Cloud presided over August 20th, Sept. 3rd & 11th and December 3rd & 17th meetings.

Gil thanked Roy Moyer for his assistance at the Chamber of Commerce International Ski Race held each year between Port Angeles and Victoria. They had 2 meter communication with Victoria Short Wave Club.

Gil read Bul. #294 on first moon bounce 2300 MHZ - the highest frequency from a moon bounce.

Russ Alexander accepted the editing of the "Boondocker".

The club joined the Puget Sound Council for Amateur Radio Clubs.

The members agreed "No Smoking" at first meeting of the month.

In 1971, Hap Helgeson was president. Russ showed the trophy for the best article to the "Boondocker". Hap Helgeson was awarded the "Boondocker" trophy by Russ.

The Puget Sound Council approved the membership of the CCARC.

Jim Cloud took care of window displays for Ham Radio Week, June 20-26th at the library.

The president was delegated to represent the CCARC at the Puget Sound Council.

Doug Landaker chaired the International Annual picnic set for August 8th at Fairview Grange site.

Russ moved to have no meetings next year in July and August. It was amended to say "no formal" meetings.

Dell Downing acquired a nice blackboard for the club.

In 1972, Max Reidel was president. The annual dinner was a buffet type at Birneys on January 6th at 7:30.

Doug Landaker took over the "Boondocker" from Russ Alexander.

Gil Welcher discussed starting a 2 M Repeater group.

Jake Leon said the S E T held on Jan. 29-30 with 10 participants and 3 mobiles with 24 hr. watch was smooth and successful. S E T - Simulated Emergency Test.

ARRL dues were increased to \$7.50 July 1, 1972.

The Victoria Club and CCARC picnic will be August 6th in Victoria.

Gilman Welcher was elected Trustee another 5 years.

Hap was awarded the 50 yr. certificate of the Quarter Century Wireless Assoc. by Gil. Hap was congratulated by all members.

Gil renewed the clubs license for another 5 years.

December 21st meeting was cancelled - too close to Christmas.

In 1973, Fred Abbott was president. A dinner with XYL's in conjunction with installation was set for Feb. 10th.

Tom Powell presided for the January 13th meeting.

The club dinner was at Birneys on Feb. 17th.

Roy Moyer took over the Vice President-Treasurer office.

The AT&T Company site at Angeles Point was favored for Field Day. Jake was chairman.

Leo White gave a rundown on his visit to Barry Goldwater's ham shack, K7UGA.

Russ Alexander was responsible for getting a postcard size duplicating machine for use in getting out notices to members.

In April Leo White and Claire were hosts to the members and XYL's.

Roy Moyer volunteered his radio shack for the first meeting in May and the XYL's were invited.

The picnic was a potluck at the Elwha Resort. Members are to bring enough for their family and a Victoria family.

The club voted to acquire the equipment of Spence Adams who had passed away.

Gil Welcher gave a talk on 2 meter F.M.

Gil Morrish offered the club his junk box. The club agreed to pick up the gear and store it.

The club's generator was moved to KONP station.

The annual dinner was at 3 Crabs on Friday, October 19th.

In 1974, Fred Abbott was president. Gil Welcher said that forms had been sent for the new 2 meter repeater. The repeater will be set up on temporary non-remote basis. Gil suggested a separate repeater committee be formed.

Secretary Roy Moyer sent out 42 letters of invitation to non-member Hams to attend the dinner with XYL's at 3 Crabs at 6:30 p.m. on February 23rd. Bob Thurston, Northwest District Director, was the speaker.

The club sponsored repeater was set up at Roy Moyer's house temporarily. Gil was authorized to direct repeater construction activities and set up a work committee.

Del Downing brought the new Honda generator to the May 21st meeting and fired it up. It will be kept at Del's. Jim Cloud helped.

Russ Alexander became FD director. Field Day was May 15th at Voice of America site. Leo accepted FD food supervisor. There will be a potluck Saturday eve and a Sunday morning breakfast at Field Day.

The Victoria Short Wave Club picnic was scheduled for July 21st.

On October 5th, a meeting was called to order by Roy Moyer, V.P., on account of the death of President Fred Abbott, WH7RHL.

Roy declined being president the rest of the year so a Board of Directors meeting was called for October 22nd at Roy's home. Bill Collyer was nominated as President, V.P.-Treasurer - Jake Leons and Secretary - Elaine Vernon. All were elected to office.

Thirty six members and two guests attended the annual dinner at Haguwoods on November 16th.

President Bill Collyer set the December 19th meeting to be at his home.

In 1975, Bill Collyer was president. Leo White took over the Vice-President-Treasurer office.

Members were invited to take anything from the junk box that they wanted.

Gil Welcher talked on the new F.C.C. proposed license changes.

Meetings were changed to Wednesday night so the President and Vice-President could go to college for three months.

The Victoria Short Wave Club picnic was at Centennial Park on June 15th.

Bill Boehm was Field Day Coordinator. There were 1368 points made with 14 operators and 7 transmitters.

There were 38 members and guests at the November 1st dinner at the Elks.

George Buck offered a room for meetings at KONP free of charge. The club accepted the offer and moved December 4th. George Buck is the attorney for CCARC.

In 1976, Bill Boehm was president. Victoria club wrote a letter of thanks for helping out during their mail strike.

Members were reminded to subscribe to QST magazine through the club as the club gets \$1.00 per subscription.

Harley Davidson was starting radio classes at Sequim School for \$10.00 for text books.

It was decided to sell the old WW2 generator for \$100.00. Jim Cloud will demonstrate it to the buyer.

The International picnic was July 18th. The cost of the picnic was \$121.50 but it was declared the best ever picnic. The picnic was at Lincoln Park.

Leo had a project to give specially designed certificates to honor our nations Bicentennial.

Field Day will be at the AT&T site.

Everyone with a 2 meter was asked to be thinking of a transmitter.

It was suggested the meeting place be changed as the room at KONP was not large enough.

Roy Moyer distributed posters advertising the Novice Radio Course at the PAHS. The members will display posters in various store windows.

The no-host dinner was set for January 29, 1977 at Harringtons.

In 1977, Jack Colman was president. Jim Cloud offered to make phone calls to find out how many were interested in a 2 meter repeater and would be willing to support it.

The guest speaker for the January 29th dinner was Bob Thurston, N.W. Division Director of ARRL. Fifty-two attended the dinner at Harringtons.

The Repeater Group decided that a repeater should be portable for special events, solid state for less maintenance. One would cost about \$1800.00 plus \$1000.00 for accessories.

Hap Helgeson arranged for club to meet at the High School in Rm. 114.

Jim Cloud, Field Day chairman, said Willie Fox will take care of food preparation.

Roy Moyer arranged for Field Day Site at AT&T property on June 25-26th. Bruce Thomson will put up a Novice Station on Field Day.

Ron Richmond checked out gear for the repeater and said it is nearly ready. He is donating the crystals required.

Gill will order antenna from Amateur Radio Supply.

Roy Moyer offered to have the repeater at his residence until all bugs are worked out and permanent location is determined.

It was voted that the repeater be a club project. It will cost \$10.00 to support the repeater and \$15.00 to join the club and support the repeater.

The Swift Sure Races, May 28-29th will be covered by Gil Welcher, Bill Collyer and Leo White.

KONP is being remodeled so Bruce Thompson offered to remove and store the club's books until a later date.

It was moved and passed to discontinue meetings during summer.

Hap Helgeson arranged for club to meet in Rm. 114 at P.A. H.S.

George Zimmerman accepted the assignment of Public Relations Person for club news.

Gil informed the club that repeater frequencies will be 146.16 in and 146.76 out. The repeater is working fine on duplex but not as a repeater until the club license arrives.

The club license has been renewed by Gil to August 26, 1982. The repeater call will be W7FEL/RPT.

Ralph Lyons presided over the Oct. 20th meeting.

Don Austin gave a report on his work with the Emergency Coordinator at the new Court House.

In 1978, Don Austin was President. President Austin announced the club would attempt to have a meeting in Sequim once a year.

The Repeater official call will be W7FEL/RPT. George Zimmerman presided over the May 4th & 18th and June 1st & 15th meetings.

The location for the repeater is the Dept. of Natural Resources facilities up on Striped Peak.

Bill Hiller gave a review of Field Day activities on June 24-25th.

The Victoria picnic was set for July 23rd at Lincoln Park. There were 104 registered - 54 U.S. and 50 Canadians.

The June meeting was held at Peninsula College Rm. SS-5 and after that in Rm. SS-1 for the rest of the summer.

Gil Welcher reported the 2M repeater is installed at Striped Peak. The antenna will be placed on the N.W. corner of the tower.

Ben Gale presided over Oct. 19th meeting in absence of Pres. Don Austin and V.P. George Zimmerman. George Zimmerman presided over Nov. 16th meeting.

In the December meeting the deaths of Don Austin and Fred Frobese were recognized by donating to Hutchinson Cancer Foundation.

Gil demonstrated a tone alert decoder for the repeater. The club purchased the alert decoder and a relay.

In 1979, John Butler was president. It was voted by the members to have a booth at the County Fair.

A Telephone Tree was instigated. Field Day was scheduled for June 29-30th at the AT&T site. Roy Moyer will conduct F.D. activities.

Meetings are back at P.A.H.S.

George Guild presented a program on the Ten Minute Timer, circuit and circuit board.

Chief Gary Burgun of the local air station (C.G.) will be the speaker for the Club Annual dinner, which is set for April 28th, at the Chuck Wagon.

As the high school was not available the meeting for April 5th was held at the Monterra Club House. April 19th, the club met back at the high school in Rm. 114.

The repeater was in use between Sappho and Clallam Bay on Burnt Mt. Rd.

George Zimmerman is getting quotes on converting the repeater to solid state.

The picnic at Victoria was Sunday, July 29th.

A metal cabinet is needed to enclose the repeater and make it lockable.

George Zimmerman passed away Friday, Sept. 7th. Pearl Guill moved that John Zimmerman, KAGANC in Springfield, Ill. be presented with a life membership in view of his father's service to the club.

The proposed By-Laws change on Article 4 Sec. 1 be changed to read: that there will be only one meeting of club which will be the third Thursday. The By-Laws change passed.

With the completion of the new Court House, Mr. Randy Hicks of Emergency Services requested information as to appropriate equipment to meet the needs of the new installation to monitor police net and many public services. Roy Moyer will work with Mr. Hicks.

Rm. 913, P.A.H.S. has been reserved through May 1980 for meeting the 3rd Thursday every month.

Gil Welcher has the cabinet ready for the repeater. George Guill has all the parts for the power supply.

The solid state repeater gear has arrived. It is small in size and weighs only 40 pounds.

Those who wish to meet for an informal breakfast with XYL's will meet at 9:00 a.m. at Birneys on December 15th. There were a dozen members who met for the breakfast.

In 1980, Howard Page was president. Twenty one members and XYL's met for a coffee break on Saturday, January 12th at Red Ranch.

The repeater receiver is completed by Gil Welcher. George Guill has most of the parts for decoder and power supply.

A 2 meter net will be started at 7:30 a.m. the first Thursday of each month.

The International picnic will be at Lincoln Park Longhouse on August 10th. Mary Tate and Pearl Guill will supervise the food. Each family to provide one large dish of food, enough to serve 8. 100 attended the picnic at Lincoln Park with the Victoria Hams and XYL's.

The high school was not available for May 15th meeting so club met at Monterra Club House.

The old repeater has been taken out. The new one is in a shake down period. at Gil Welcher's residence.

The repeater now has a "beeper." George Guill asked users to pause and wait for the "beep."

The repeater is on the hill at Striped Peak and working well. The power supply has been installed and working.

Pearl Guill acted as secretary protem for Sec. Mary Tate at Nov. 20th meeting.

In 1981, Howard Page was president. Gil Welcher is now Emergency Coordinator for Clallam County with John Butler Assistant. Larry Ackley is coordinator for the eastern part of the county.

Eric's Novice class had its second session at Monterra Club House. Chan assisted with code work.

Florence Leavett sent a note to the club saying how much Gordon had enjoyed the Ham radio during the last part of his life.

Randy Hicks of Clallam County Emergency Operations invited the club to apply for use of its facilities as a meeting place in the Court House. Randy Hicks invitation to meet in Rm. 070 in the Court House was accepted.

Norm Thurston briefed the club on the organization of "SHARP" (Sheriff Amateur Radio Program) which had been associated with crime prevention.

Gil reported test gear was not included with installation of new repeater and he will order it.

Gil Welcher has served as Trustee for twelve years and wishes to be relieved of the office as he may be away off and on.

Field Day will be June 27-28th at the AT&T site. Fifty came to F.D. potluck.

Dell Downing funeral was July 16th. The President called for a moment of silence.

About sixty CCARC people went to the International picnic at Victoria on August 9th. Blise Welcher won the prize.

John Butler said that a local source will make XYL's badges for \$2.50 for 1 line.

There are 94 members paid up and 103 including family memberships.

October 15th meeting adjourned with a moment of silence for "Silent Key" Vern St. Louis who passed away October 9th.

Membership cards are to be issued starting January 1982.

Richard Granum donated a used tape recorder for use of the secretary in writing up the minutes.

Rusty Ryan is the new editor of the "Boondocker".

At November 7th breakfast in Sequim there were 52. The next breakfast is at Haguwoods in Port Angeles.

George Guill announced the repeater is about "brownout" proof as any repeater can be.

Roy Moyer donated a 1925 receiver to Clallam County Historical Society in the name of the CCARC. He prepared a drawing to go with it.

When the giant snow storm came in on New Years Eve, it really dumped a lot of snow all over Striped Peak as well as every place else in the area. The storm made the primary power of the repeater fail and the backup battery become discharged, so Rick Granum and Ken Norton braved the treacherous road up to Striped Peak to replace the back up battery and that put the repeater on the air. George Guiland Roy Moyer kept in touch with them on the 2 meters.
